



'The holidays are coming; the holidays are coming'...

You might recognise these opening words as the soundtrack for a Christmas advert for a well-known fizzy soft drink. Of course, we call those holidays 'Christmas' and 'holidays' in our context usually refers to the summer break we all like to take some time between June and September. So, for those of us fortunate enough to be able to take one, the 'holidays are coming.'

What kind of holiday do you prefer? The comfort of the all-in package deal, a cruise maybe, caravaning, the knuckle-biting adventure of backpacking, or maybe something in-between? The nation's holiday habits have changed in recent years, and since COVID camping has boomed, and not just because it's cheap and you can keep your distance from each other! There is something about the flexibility and freedom it promises, plus comfort is no longer something you leave at home with half the tent pegs. Today's multicoloured tents appear to blossom in just a few minutes from a foldaway bag into a twelve-person palace. Electric hook-ups keep the milk fresh, or whatever liquid refreshment you choose to take with you, and collapsable bowls mean that you can literally take the kitchen sink with you. Camping, or should I say glamping, may be flexible, carefree and versatile, but it is certainly not travelling light. Even so, people love it – or at least some do.

Travelling light features twice in Luke's Gospel, when Jesus sends groups of people out into the Galilean countryside to preach the Good News. Firstly, the twelve disciples and a few chapters later, seventy followers. He gave both groups the same instructions, and orders both groups to take nothing for the journey, 'No purse, no bag, no sandals.' He reminds the seventy that they are to be totally focused on the task, they are to 'Greet no one on the road;' presumably the twelve disciples didn't need reminding.

Crucially, they are to travel light, staying where they are welcome and moving on where they are not. Surely it would have make much more sense strategically if Jesus had told them to go well prepared? After all, they didn't know what they might find, and their reception might be hostile. Surely better to find a safe base, some friendly people, and work from there. It seems, though, that Jesus wants them to learn from their task, and perhaps he knows that the quickest way to learn something new is to be thrown onto the unexpected, the untried and the different; to be 'thrown in at the deep end.'

In a culture which was strongly structured around familial ties, it would have been very unlikely that the followers would not have been able to find at least one distant relative to put them up safely. But Jesus tells them to stay in whatever house they go to first, provided they are welcome. In so doing, they discover that strangers can also provide a welcome and be willing to hear a story of hope. Should one of their garments tear, they must find someone to repair it from an unexpected place, and in so doing, that mender will hear the Good News first-hand from someone who believes it passionately.

We know that the followers returned to Jesus bursting with joy, having found that they too had something of the power of God in their hands, just as the disciples had found it a chapter or two earlier. So perhaps there is something in this travelling light; in taking nothing for the journey. The 'call of the wild,' that many people seek in a tent, is not just a desire for a refreshing and cheap holiday but has a spiritual cause at its heart.

We are a rooted people. We invest huge amounts of time, money and emotional currency into our houses and our communities. But while these things provide us with safety and security, they can also set a trap: a place where we become so used to the people and things around us that we somehow find it hard to bring God's message to bear upon our lives and those of the people we know. Perhaps the urge to travel, or any other urge to experience the unknown, is an attempt to remind ourselves what it means to be without all the responsibilities and even luxuries, and so be able to move as we please, even if it might involve a twelve-person tent and a fridge.

To learn something new about ourselves and about God, and to find the will to share it with others, often requires a new perspective that often only comes from the untried path. There is a place for home and security, but it is on the journey, unencumbered by all the things we rely on, that we most often break open our hearts and minds, and find what the powerful message of God's good news really means.

If you are having a holiday or not this summer, I hope you find an opportunity to rest and discover something new about yourself and about God in whatever you do, and wherever you do it...

CHARITY CHRISTMAS CARD SHOP 2025

A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE – 265 KEEPING DOGS OUT OF OUR CHURCH

Three years ago, in July 2022, we looked at our early churchwardens' accounts, for the years 1579 to 1615, to examine the arrangements at that time for keeping the church interior – its floors, and its fabrics – clean through the year. In the closing paragraphs of that article, I mentioned other payments in those accounts "for whipping the dogs out of church", referring to my trusty copy of J. Charles Cox's *Churchwardens' accounts from the 14th century to the close of the 17th century (1913), which indicated that, in Tudor times, "almost every parish possessed a modestly paid official termed the dog-whipper".*

This month, I am returning to this topic. In July 2022, I said that payments for whipping the dogs appeared in our accounts from 1606 through to 1614, but a seemingly more thorough check of William Day's transcript of the accounts for the years 1579—1613 has revealed that the printed accounts include a total of 18 entries for these payments, with three further items found in the loose pages of the accounts for 1613—1615, stored at Shropshire Archives, not included in the printed transcript.

In fact, the earliest payments date back to the 1590s. In 1592, there were two payments of one shilling and two pence, and of three pence, made to Owen Moynore or Owen Moynoure "for whipping the dogges out of the church"; and in 1596/97 a payment of thirteen pence to "Owen Boynagwre". I will need to check the account book for this entry, to confirm the spelling, but it seems probable that all three payments were made to someone recorded in the burial records for April 1597 as "Owen Mwynwr a beggar", his surname suggesting that he had been a miner, very likely a coal miner.

The remainder of the payments date from 1605/06 through to 1614/15, and with just one exception were made to Hugh ap David, sometimes recorded as 'Hugh o'r Pistill' or 'Hugh of the Pistill', a name suggesting that he lived near to the Pistyll Croft at the foot of Beatrice Street.

Each of the payments listed for the years from 1605/6 through to 1610/11 was for one shilling, with later payments each of two shillings. However, it is not entirely clear whether this change represents a pay rise (indeed a doubling of the amount paid) or just a change in how the payment was made — from four quarterly payments of a shilling to two half-yearly

payments of two shillings. In 1608/09 there were four payments, each of a shilling; in 1610/11 there were three payments, two of one shilling, and one of two shillings; and in 1613/14 there were just two payments, each of two shillings helpfully described as "his haulfe years wages" and "his laste haulfe years wages".

Our burial registers tell us when Hugh ap David died – recording the burial on October 10th 1619 of "Hugh ap David or Pistill" but I have been unable to confirm anything further about our dog whipper. Baptism records seem to indicate that there were at least two men known as Hugh ap David living in Oswestry at this time, one living in Willow Street, another described as a weaver (he was still live in 1621, so can be ruled out).

We are left with the question: why was there a need at this time to employ someone to remove dogs from the church – here in Oswestry, and across the country? J. Charles Cox's *Churchwardens' accounts* tells me that in former times almost every cottager possessed a dog and that the dog was "often in the habit of attending church with its master. The dog whipper was armed with a dog-whip: Mr Cox describes one hanging in the vestry at St Anne's, Baslow, Derbyshire², with a stout lash three feet long, fastened to a short ash stick, with leather bound around the handle. Some churches had a pair of iron, or wooden tongs: again, my *Churchwardens' accounts* describes a pair in the church at Llanynys, Denbighshire (and still there today) which, when closed were about 2 ft 6 inches long, but which extended to over 6 feet in length – long enough to catch hold of a dangerous dog from a safe distance.

Consulting the internet, I see that St Margaret's church, Wrenbury, between Whitchurch and Nantwich, has a dog whipper's pew; and I am told, by Wikipedia, that one of the last recorded dog whippers, employed to carry out the original role (rather than to a purely ceremonial office) was John Pickard, appointed dog whipper at Exeter Cathedral in 1856. I will need, when I have the opportunity, to check our churchwardens' accounts from the early 18th century to see if they may include any further payments relating to dogs.

ST. OSWALD'S LADIES GROUP

The Ladies Group met in the Parish Centre on Monday 7th July. Judi Neale led us in prayer and introduced our speaker Sarah Gibson to speak to us about Conservation - Swifts and Us'.

Swifts live almost entirely in the air. They eat, drink, sleep, mate and gather their nesting materials on the wing, fly thousands of miles across the world, navigating their way around storms, never alighting on tree, cliff or ground, until they return home for the summer to the same hole under the eaves as the previous year.

Sarah has written a fascinating story of discovery, exploring what is known about these mysterious birds, their ancient ancestry and how they have been regarded through history. Unfortunately the swifts are in real danger as we are sealing our homes against wildlife of any kind. Cracks, gaps and crevices which for thousands of years have offered nesting space in buildings are being closed off, while new housing rarely offers entry holes for nesting birds. Loss of breeding places is considered to be a significant factor in the steep decline of these birds over the last twenty years.

There are people in the UK and across Europe striving to ensure a future for swifts.

Sarah tells us that everyone can do something to keep these superb birds screaming through our skies. She has travelled across Europe watching swifts and meeting experts and key researchers along the way. We do have boxes in the tower of our Church but no residents yet!

This was a most interesting talk and enjoyed by everyone.

There will be no meeting in August but at our next meeting on Monday September 1st at 2.30 p.m. in the Parish Centre we welcome Andrew Preston who will speak to us about The RJAH Veterans Orthopaedic Centre.



REDEFINING REST

Apparently, Summer = Rest and relaxation. Two things most of us need more of. As we enjoy the blue skies and sunshine (obviously alongside the very British moaning about the weather, "it's a bit hot isn't it!") many people start thinking about holidays.

My experience is that holidays don't necessarily equate to rest and/or relaxation! Whether it's the anxiety of travelling, the cost, the kids (no we're not nearly there yet!) or simply the fact that even on holiday there's so much to do!

There is a wealth of information 'out there' that stresses the importance of rest and relaxation for our mental and physical wellbeing, and Jesus said we would find rest with him (Mt 11v28). But that's not always the easiest. I believe that Jesus was quite a fan of wellbeing — he wanted us to be ourselves, not strive to be someone we're not and he stressed the importance of resting.

I recently read an email that reminded me of the importance of looking after our own wellbeing and a specific line hit me "We are our own responsibility after all". The article continued by suggesting that if we don't look after our own wellbeing then our ability to truly embrace who we are, and to live that out, will reduce.

There is truth in this. Jesus commented that everything rests (excuse the pun!) on two things – Love the Lord your God and love your neighbour as yourself (Mt 22:37-39). If we focus on the last bit of that I believe it means that we need to be able to love ourselves – who we are – and to pay attention to how we look after ourselves; we need holistic rest (mental, physical, emotional, spiritual). Only then are we able to serve and love others.

Rest looks different for everyone, it's not just about stopping and sitting quietly (although that can be good), to me it's something that gives you chance to put aside work/life etc for a few minutes and focus on something that feeds your soul. This could be nature, exercise, art, coffee with friends, dancing, computer games etc etc.

For many of us the summer doesn't automatically equal holiday, rest and relaxation. Life goes on; churches have summer fete's and regular services need to function with various people on holiday; kids are off school and after two days are bored and searching for things to do – often whilst parents and carers are trying to juggle who has the kids whilst they

try and juggle work! So yes, rest and relaxation can be a tall order to reach.

Jesus doesn't ask us to be perfect though (phew!) - he simply nudges us to find small nuggets here and there where we can rest – in whatever way helps us.

UNDER YOUR FEET



By August, areas of long, flowery grassland should have been cut (unless you have late flowering species such as scabious or betony present, in which case these areas can

be left a little longer). With the cutting and raking of long grass there is often an opportunity to spy onto the world of small rodents such as mice, shrews and voles who may have made routes through the sward that are revealed by the cut.

Small rodents are short lived and highly reproductive, wood mice for example tend to live for about a year, during which time they may have up to six litters of between four and eight young. In a churchyard you may have several species of mice, shrews and voles, the most likely being wood mice, field vole and common shrew. Wood mice have large ears and eyes, useful for their largely nocturnal life whilst field voles have blunter noses and smaller ears and eyes, they can be active during the day and night. Shrews are distinctive with a long, pointed nose and tiny eyes. All of these animals need to feed frequently and are always on the move seeking food, with shrews eating 80 to 90% of their body weight each day. They feed on insects and other invertebrates but will also tackle quite large earthworms, far bigger than they are! Mice and voles seek out seeds, berries and fruits, some of which they may stash for later. Whilst mice can be agile climbers, voles tend to stick to the ground, following the trails they make through grassland that you can see after a cut.

Unfortunately for voles and mice, they are important prey items for a range of other species. Tawny owls, also often found in churchyards, hunt silently for small rodents as do kestrels, weasels, foxes and of course cats. If you are interested to find out more, look for owl pellets beneath a nest or roosting place, these are regurgitated bundles of the inedible parts of their food and often contain bones which can be teased out of the pellet and then identified, giving information on what they have been eating. Shrews by contrast are not such a staple food item, you may find a bitten and dead shrew lying on a path suggesting that it has been hunted but was not very tasty.

Churchyards and other burial grounds are havens for rodents, containing a mosaic of grassland, shrubs, woodland and lots of places to make burrows or use existing cracks, nooks and crannies. Free of herbicides and pesticides they are full of food, both invertebrates and plant material whilst areas of long meadow and tussocky coarse grass provide perfect cover. See if you can spot their burrows and runways and imagine their busy lives in the fast lane!


