Remembering in new ways... again

November is traditionally a time of remembering. At our annual All Souls service on 2nd November, when we gather to remember those we love but see no longer. On the 9th and the 11th of this month, Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday, we think of those who have died or have been injured in the service of our country. In addition, on the 7th some will gather at the cemetery with local school children to place a cross of remembrance on the war graves and hear the stories of some of the fallen.

Sadly, this year, as in years gone by, it remains the case that wars still rage; the conflict between Ukraine and Russia dominates the European headlines whilst significant wars across the continent of Africa, rarely appear. It isn't all bleak of course, at the time of writing, the ceasefire between Israel and Hamas is holding though violence continues in Gaza where life remains precarious for many. Whilst life is still full of signs and portents that things aren't as they should be, the sense of relief across the world is palpable and hope shines brighter day by day.

This Remembrance Sunday, we are trying something slightly different. To enable those who would like to attend both church in the morning and the Act of Remembrance at the gates, we are holding the service in church at 9:30 am. This will finish around 10:30 which will give enough time for people to walk to the gates, it also means that the choir can help lead the Remembrance service. The choir will also be in action later in the day at the Civic Commemoration service beginning at 4pm.

Looking a little further forward into November and December. Advent and Christmas will soon be upon us and whilst there will be more information in next month's magazine about Christmas, I thought it might be helpful to outline what we are doing at St. Oswalds to help you keep and celebrate the season of Advent.

Advent, from the Latin *adventus*, meaning 'coming', or 'arrival' starts on November 30th. Advent is all about beginnings, it is the season of anticipation, of waiting expectantly for the arrival of a child. For a few weeks each year it provides us with a reminder that despite the events in the world around us, we can continue to live in an age of hopeful anticipation. Advent is a reminder that hope, however far off and fleeting we feel it might be, remains at the heart of God's promise, because God's promise always arrives. It arrives in the form of a child, Jesus, Emmanuel, 'God with us.'

December is always an exciting month. For many because it forms the run up to Christmas when we go to parties and 'shop 'till we drop'. The festivities of Christmas are important for many reasons and the giving of gifts and sharing of time with each other can reinforce ties of family and friendship. It can however feel rather pressured, and Advent allows time to prepare as we anticipate Christmas and all that it brings.

So, let this short but glorious season of Advent enfold you in hope and anticipation. Let it, in the face of doubts and fears, be a time of expectation in 'that which is yet to come' because Advent is the time when we remember that God answers his promises and is always faithful.

This year St. Oswald's is offering a range of resources to enable you to keep a hopeful Advent. There will be weekly addresses on the Wednesdays in December, and cards and prayer resources for you to use at home with your family or by yourself. These can be found in the Library Area in St. Oswald's as the pop-up Charity Christmas Cards shop is once again located in the Chapel of St. George.

Advent is the season of contemplating Jesus's historic arrival and his return, each year reminds us that Advent does not leave Christians simply waiting in hope, biding our time. It invites us to turn again to the Lord and in penitence and preparation to declare and live out the 'manifesto' of God's kingdom.

November beckons us to gather in grateful remembrance to reflect on past events before we turn once again in hope in December, to embrace the future as we journey towards the fulfilment of God's Kingdom.

May God bless you on that journey...

LIGHT AND TRUTH

Much as I'd prefer not to think about Christmas presents and cards until the week before Christmas, the reality is that as soon as Bonfire Night and Remembrance Sunday are over, I must procrastinate no longer! Poor Advent. It's lost in the mists of time, its season of spiritual preparation for Christmas overtaken by ever exotic Advent Calendars, their numbered windows promising expensive 'treats' to help us to get through the stress of Christmas preparations. I've even seen a cheese-a-day Advent calendar. Seriously, who thought of that one?

Instead of moaning about the commercialism of Christmas, here at Lichfield Cathedral we do all we can to keep the Sundays of Advent special, beginning with the hauntingly beautiful Advent Carol Service. But then we go 'full bling' with the Christmas Light Show and the Christmas Tree Festival. They're ever popular, a seasonal 'must' in many people's diaries. And at the heart of both, is a search for the light in the midst of the darkness. Physical light in the long nights of winter. And spiritual light in a world which feels chaotic and dark.

One of my favourite worship songs is 'Christ be our Light' by the Roman Catholic songwriter Bernadette Farrell. It's beautiful. If you don't know it and have access to the internet, do search for it. You'll soon be singing along to its gentle tune and meaningful lyrics.

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

This is why, I think, so many people turn to the Church at Christmas, on the shortest days of the year. Our ancestors prayed that the sun would return. Some of our members gave a reflection on Harvest in their younger days which was very interesting how things have changed over the years.



A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE – 268 ST ANNE'S CHAPEL AT MORDA HOUSE

Last month I mentioned that the online British Newspaper Archive had recently added four more years of the *Oswestry Advertizer* to its files, increasing the number of years which could be accessed in this way to twelve. At the same time, the Newspaper Archive had added copies of the short-lived *Oswestry Herald*, which was published weekly from March 1820 to December 1822, and last month's article looked at some of the reports featured in the *Herald*.

This month, I have taken a look at the *Advertizer* for 1882 and 1883, to see what stories related to St Oswald's it might contain. As you might imagine, these included reports on church meetings, the Archdeacon's Visitation, a choral festival, services for the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, the annual church schools' summer outing with a visit to Oakhurst, supper for the bellringers at the Sun Inn, and a church parade by the Oswestry Company of Volunteers. There were letters, some from the curate the Rev. T.C.V. Bastow, regarding 'Saint Oswald's potatoes' (which I might well come back to on a future occasion), and editorial support from the *Advertizer* for our clergy having omitted a sentence from a prayer circulated by the Archbishop of York giving thanks

for a military victory in Egypt (again, I may return to this). Local newspapers, particularly at this time, were a real mine of information, covering a wide range of local events, and doing so in great depth.

However, for the time being, I will focus on three items, from the editions of the *Advertizer* for August 16th 1882, November 29th 1882, and October 31st 1883 – all relating to the construction of a chapel at the House of Industry (the 'workhouse') in Morda.

Readers may recall an archaeology series on Channel 4 fronted by the comedian and actor Hugh Dennis called 'The Great British Dig', where a small team of archaeologists would visit somewhere, for a limited period, and conduct small scale excavations often in people's gardens, to answer questions about the past. In May 2022, one of these programmes focussed on Morda, and on the site of Morda House, which was destroyed by fire in 1982; little now remains beyond one handsome red brick house near to the main road, with much of the site now redeveloped for housing including Kingfisher Way and St Anne's Drive.

I recall conversations in the days directly after the programme was broadcast where, after comments that it was good to see our part of the world featured in this way, puzzlement was expressed at the apparent surprise shown by what they found – including evidence for a free-standing chapel. Hadn't the producers looked at old maps of the area which would have shown the footprint of Morda House, including its chapel? Looking this week at these *Advertizers* for 1882 and 1883 brought those conversations back to me, as I saw the level of detail set out in the various newspaper reports.

On August 16th 1882, the *Advertizer* carried an advertisement placed by the Shrewsbury architect Mr S. Pountney Smith, seeking "tenders ... for the erection of a Chapel at the Union Poor House, Morda ... for the Honourable Mrs Cotton [of Park Hall]; the Plans and Specifications for which may be seen, and any further information obtained, at the offices of the Architect, Coleham, Shrewsbury". The deadline for tenders was Wednesday August 30th.

It is often commented that building plans proceeded fast in Victorian times. In this case, building works commenced on the ground in November 1882, under the supervision of the Shrewsbury builder John Gethin. The *Advertizer* for November 29th reported at some length on the laying of the foundation stone the previous Thursday, carried out by the Hon. Mrs Stapleton Cotton, who, readers were told, had "most generously undertaken to defray the entire cost of the new building" except for the foundations which were funded, in cash and kind, by members of the local community. The foundation laying ceremony commenced with a service

in the existing workhouse chapel, attended by the Directors and Officers of the institution, and "all the inmates of the House who were able to attend" including children, with prayers by the chaplain (the Rev. John Morris), the Rev. T.C.V. Bastow, and the Vicar of St Oswald's, the Rev. Canon Howell Evans. All then processed to the site of the new chapel, unfortunately in pouring rain. There were speeches, hymns and, a silver trowel and mallet having been presented to Mrs Stapleton Cotton, "the stone having been raised and the mortar deftly spread by Mrs Cotton, it was lowered into its place". At the close of the ceremony, tea and coffee were served in the Dining Room, which had been decorated for the occasion.

Just under a year later, on Saturday October 27th the new chapel was consecrated by the Bishop of St Asaph. The *Advertizer* noted that it was "henceforth to be known as the Chapel of St Anne, Morda", and "for the use of the officers and inmates of the Oswestry House of Industry, and for the district of Morda". Though sited next to the workhouse, the new chapel was not part of it: Mrs Stapleton Cotton had acquired the land on which it was built, and appointed trustees to manage its affairs.

The Advertizer described the building as "a very elegant little Gothic structure, which will for the future replace the commonplace room within the house which has hitherto done duty as a chapel". The 'paper commented on the delay in constructing the building, due largely to the difficulties presented by the site, which required more substantial foundations than anticipated. The chapel itself, built to accommodate 250 worshippers, had a nave, transepts to north and south, and an apsidal chancel, with a total length of 71 feet. The Advertizer noted that "a peculiar feature is an unusually large and commodious western porch with richly moulded stone work and carving at the entrance door. There is another porch entering into the south transept for the convenience of infirm worshippers". The chapel was built of hollow walled bricks from the Sweeney Company's Works, with stone dressings; there was an open timber roof covered externally with Broseley tiles; the chancel area was laid with Maw & Co.'s glazed tiles; and there were, in all, nine windows, glazed by Mr Davies of Shrewsbury. All the furniture was provided by Mrs Stapleton Cotton.

As with the laying of the foundation stone, the report provided a lengthy description of the service of consecration, which was attended by numerous clergy from the neighbourhood. A surpliced choir had been provided for the occasion, largely composed of members of St Oswald's choir, and Mr Percy Mull, St Oswald's organist, "presided at the harmonium".

November is a busy time for music in church. We open with a double bill on Sunday 2nd November when we celebrate the Feast of All Saints at the Eucharist and remember those who have passed away during the year at our All Souls Service at 4.00pm. This is a particularly moving event when those whose loved ones have had funerals at St. Oswald's during the year are invited to return for a service of remembrance.

The following Sunday (9th November) is Remembrance Day. This year there is a change to the format which has been in use since the Covid lockdowns. There will be a Said Eucharist at 9.30am in church and everyone is invited to attend the Town's Act of Remembrance at Park gates at 11.00am. I understand that there will be seating for those unable to stand for the duration of the service but do check this out if you want to take advantage of it.

In the afternoon there will be a Civic Commemoration at 4.00pm in church. Do come along to remember those who gave their lives in war and to pray for peace.

On Saturday 22nd November at 11.00am there will be a Memorial Service for Brian Gresham. Many will remember Brian and his wife Elizabeth who lived in Lower Brook Street for many years. Brian was a retired naval commander and took an active role in the life of the church. He was for some years a church warden and who can forget the hilarious pantomimes which he put on each year.

Do come along and support Brian's family as they give thanks for the life of this very special and extraordinary man.

Finally, Advent begins at the end of the month and we will have our popular Advent Carol Service at 6.00pm on Sunday 30th November. The first part of the service takes place in darkness, so do come in good time so that you can be seated before the lights are put out.

The symbolism of the service is the moving from darkness into the light of Christ. The procession forms at the west end and from there visits every part of the church. As the service progresses, light increases until, when the procession enters the Chancel and Sanctuary, the church is ablaze with light.

It is a wonderful way to begin Advent and I look forward to seeing many of you there.

OVERWINTERING REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS



Churchyards, chapel yards and cemeteries are great places to find both amphibians and reptiles. These two groups include frogs, toads, newts, lizards and snakes. The first three can come as a surprise as burial grounds

rarely have ponds in them but actually, frogs, toads and newts all spend much of their time on land and really use ponds mainly for breeding and laying spawn. Amphibians (frogs, toads and newts) and reptiles (lizards and snakes) all hibernate, except for some individuals in particularly mild winters, and whilst some amphibians may overwinter within ponds, most find a suitable spot on land.

Both amphibians and reptiles need to overwinter in places that are frost-free and unlikely to flood. They need to be protected from predators and from disturbance. This might be within the soil, perhaps using a crack caused by grave subsidence or beneath tree roots, under stones and grave kerbs, inside a chest tomb with a suitable hole or wide crack to clamber in, between the stones of a wall, under a pile of leaves or in a pile of deadwood. Woodland soil, with shade and leaves can be particularly good.

One of the differences between amphibians and reptiles is in their skin. Amphibians have smooth skin which can look velvety or have a bumpy, warty texture. Their skin is permeable which means they can dry out. When on land, they need to keep moist, so will overwinter in a damp and shady spot, often under leaves or deadwood. Reptiles have scales and impermeable skin so don't need a damp spot and may use compost heaps as well as cracks in walls and monuments. Amphibian skin can also pick up chemicals easily, herbicides, pesticides and fertilizers can be fatal, again making burial grounds, with their lack of chemicals, particularly suitable. N.B. you may see coloured frogs that have picked up the colour of the soil where they overwinter, these can be quite brightly coloured red, orange or yellow.

Try to imagine that you are an amphibian or reptile and take a good look around your local churchyard or cemetery and you'll probably see that its full of good spots to hibernate. You can increase these however. How about making a dead hedge or pile of deadwood in a shady spot? Do you have a compost heap? Try not to empty it after the end of October in case its in use for overwintering. Tussocks of coarse grass and grassland plants like hogweed, particularly when next to a wall are favoured by slow worms, probably the most common reptile found in burial grounds. Shrubs and scrub often offer suitable nooks and crannies at their base.

By November its likely that amphibians and reptiles will be tucked safely away, although the timing does depend on the temperature in a particular year, but it's nice to know that they might be there awaiting the warmer weather of spring.



Wordsearch on St Andrew (Feast Day 30th November)

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8th century to Fife and preserved at a church in a place now named St Andrews.

Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many fervent Jews at the time Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed out Jesus to Andrew and his friend, and described him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men assumed that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So as Jesus made off, they followed him.

When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about his current place of residence: 'where are you staying?'

The reply of Jesus was the most straight-forward invitation anyone can receive: 'Come and see'. So they did, and the results of their response were life changing. For Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and soon the little apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed. And right at the front of the column, as it were, was Andrew, the first disciple of Jesus.




